New Knowledge:

- Christians believe describe God as a creator
- God is omnipresent, omnipotent, omniscient, omnibenevolent
- Christians believe that there is only one God, but that this one God consists of 3 "persons"; God the Father, God the Son, The Holy Spirit.
- Throughout history, people have used art, music and literature to portray God, express their religious beliefs, and to help them to focus on practices such as prayer and worship.
- In different time periods and in different religions they all depict God in a different way. Depictions of God also differ between different parts of the world
- Christians believe in the Holy Trinity the father, the son and the
 holy spirit. They are reminded of this through different. Symbols are
 used to portray God as 'Three in One' e.g. three linked circles or
 rings. This is known as the Holy Trinity.
- Faith can impact the moral decisions that Christians make.
- The story of Abraham is also important to Jews and Muslims
- Abraham's faith in God was tested with his promise to see if he would take God for his word.
